Latest news: Orienteering near and far

The Easter holidays brought orienteering opportunities locally and across the country.

Virtual Orienteering courses which you can do at any time have been launched across the county with the latest area to come online being **Tonbridge Castle**. A launch event was staged on 4 April with nearly 100 people participating mostly as family groups. See following page for further details.

Further afield, the British Orienteering Championships were held near Newbury on 25/26 March. Both Long Distance and Relays were staged over the 2 days with competitors aged from under 10 to over 80. Anyone can enter, and it is a great way to explore different areas of the UK.

Over the Easter weekend the 'JK' International Orienteering Festival was held in the Lake District. Named after Jan Kjellstrom a Swedish Orienteer who played an important role in bringing the sport to the UK, it was started in 1967 and is traditionally held over the 4 day Easter weekend, with Sprint, Middle Distance, Long Distance and Relay events.

Did you know the Female World Orienteering Sprint Champion is from the UK? Megan Carter Davis took the title in Denmark in 2022.

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Medway School Games Orienteering Competition: May 11 2023

Preparations are at the final stages for the Medway School Games Orienteering Competition which will be held at Capstone Country Park on 11 May between 9.30 am and 2 pm. Targeted at year 8, teams of four will aim to complete two courses around the park with the winning teams clocking up the fastest overall combined time.

Capstone Country Park has been newly mapped for the occasion and the terrain is ideally suited for a beginner with plenty of open terrain and a good path network. There will also be orienteering games to have a go at in between courses including a Maze.

The Outdoor Classroom



Add outdoor activity into your curriculum delivery with The Outdoor Classroom.

Developed by Josh Jenner, children navigate courses with bespoke learning opportunities at each checkpoint. At the end of the course, all the answers are stored on the website for review by the teacher. As it's a digital system, it tracks the distance covered, number of pupil's active plus the number of hours spent outside. It is an ideal way of getting schools active. Access to Ipad or equivalent required.

British Schools Orienteering Championships

The British Schools Orienteering Association organises two competitions each year, a Score Competition and the British Schools Orienteering Championships. In 2023 the Score Competition is scheduled to take place in October in Leicestershire with a venue still TBD for the School Championships.

In 2024, the School Orienteering Championships are set to come to Kent and will be held at Shorne Country Park. Plenty of time to develop those budding orienteers!

The championships are for individuals by year/gender, and cover years 5 through to year 13 with courses increasing in distance and difficulty accordingly.

Any school is welcome to enter a team to compete at either event, subject to the children being able to read an orienteering map competently and be confident in using basic navigational techniques and to have competed in at least three orienteering events at the appropriate standard for their age.



Summer Orienteering Activity: Mini Map Exercise

Skills: Introduction of map reading and drawing, practice relating maps to the areas they represent, orientating the map, thumbing the map.



Choose two small adjacent outside areas bounded by clearly defined features, such as a wall, a fence, concrete curb, hedge or path.

The areas should have at least 10 suitable places to use as control sites, such as single trees, posts, rubbish tin, path junction, path corner, building corner, permanent seat or table.

Take the students step-by-step through drawing:

- The boundary features
- Features easy to relate by distance and direction to those already mapped
- Add the key (legend) to the map.

The best map can be photocopied for those students having difficulty with map drawing.

Talk about suitable places to put controls: the end of something, the corner of something, or something small, e.g., not the centre of a long thing, not hidden, not high up like in a tree.

Organise students in pairs. One partner of each pair draws a map of one area, and the other draws the second area. Each student takes 4 – 6 mini controls (coloured ribbon or tape would work just as well) and chooses places to put them.

Each should mark circles on their map to show the location of each control. Circles should be numbered in the order to be visited. (The number should be beside each circle, not in the circle as that could hide the feature to be found). Start and finish places should be chosen and marked on the map.

Each student gets their partner who does the course, starting as the Start, going around the course, collecting the controls as they go. The "course setter" should follow the "orienteer" to offer help if there are any problems.

The students then reverse roles.

Students who finish the activity early could set out another course for another partner.
